# Important information regarding the Programme Specification

#### **About this document**

Last revised: 28 April 2021

The Programme Specification gives a broad outline of the structure and content of the programme, the entry level qualifications, as well as the learning outcomes students will achieve as they progress. #### **Terminology**

The following language is specific to the Global Diplomacy programmes:

**Associate Tutor**: Programme team member who delivers small group teaching, or may be used for their specialist expertise to deliver lectures or lead seminars.

**Dissertation development stage**: A learning stage that follows each module which develops the skills needed to write and submit a final dissertation.

**Elective modules**: Pathway specific optional modules that are studied in succession after the core module(s).

**E-tivity:** online assessment prepared in response to a task or tasks specified by the Programme Director.

**Module**: Individual units of the programmes are called modules. Each module is a self-contained, formally structured learning experience with a coherent and explicit set of learning outcomes and assessment criteria.

#### **Key revisions made**

Programme specifications are revised annually. The quality committee with responsibility for Global Diplomacy: Regions Pathways, as part of its annual review of standards, confirms the programme structure and the educational aims and learning outcomes, and advises on any development in student support.

## **Programme title and qualifications**

An exit qualification is an intermediate qualification for which the student may not have registered at the outset but which may be awarded on completion of specific modules/courses (or credit accumulated) in a longer programme of study, if the student leaves the programme.

Exit qualifications are awarded at the discretion of the Board of Examiners and once a student has accepted an exit qualification they will not normally be permitted to continue their study under these regulations.

#### **Programme structures**

Each MA Global Diplomacy: *Regions Pathways* programme consists of four modules and a dissertation as follows:

- Two core modules
- Two elective modules derived from the list of those available
- A dissertation

All students must study the core module/s first. All assessments for each module must normally be submitted before a student may progress to a subsequent module.

Full details of the Scheme of Award are included in the **Programme Regulations**.

#### Maximum and minimum periods of registration

The maximum and minimum period of registration, from a student's effective date of registration, are:

Study materials are made available after registration and on payment of the applicable fee.

#### Credit value of modules

Further information about the credit systems used by universities in the UK and Europe is provided by the <u>Quality Assurance Agency</u> and the <u>European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System</u>.

Where credits are assigned to each module of a programme, credit indicates the amount of learning carried out in terms of the notional number of study hours needed, and the specified FHEQ credit level indicates the depth, complexity and intellectual demand of learning involved. The details below indicate the UK credits and the European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS) values.

For each Global Diplomacy programme, credits are assigned to the modules as follows:

- 30 UK credits or 15 ECTS credits at FHEQ Level 7 for the core and elective modules.
- 60 UK credits or 30 ECTS credits at FHEQ Level 7 for the dissertation module.

A student awarded an MA will have accumulated 180 UK credits or 90 ECTS credits.

One UK credit equates to a notional ten hours of learning.

#### Recognition of prior learning and credit transfer

Recognition of prior learning is a generic term for the process by which we recognise and, where appropriate, award credit for learning that has taken place elsewhere, before entry onto this programme of study.

Where the prior learning covered a similar syllabus to a module/course studied elsewhere, credit will be awarded as if you took the University of London module/course.

See the <u>General Regulations</u> (Section 3) [and <u>Programme Regulations</u>] for more rules relating to prior learning.

For this programme the University of London may recognise your prior learning and award you credit towards the qualification.

# Educational aims and learning outcomes of the programmes

## **Learning outcomes of the Global Diplomacy programmes:**

The programme takes an integrated approach to knowledge, intellectual, practical and transferrable skills. As such the educational aims for Global Diplomacy and the associated pathways are as follows:

- The ability to demonstrate an in-depth critical understanding of the nature and development of global and/or regional diplomacy, as applicable, drawing on a variety of contributing disciplines.
- An advanced understanding of changes in global and/or regional diplomacy and procedures and the relationship of those changes to contemporary international politics.
- A sound grounding in both theoretical and empirical approaches to debates in global diplomacy and regional differentiations so that students have the competencies and skills to analyse global events using a mixture of theoretical and empirical tools.
- A detailed knowledge of issues in global diplomacy and/or the region in historical and contemporary contexts. By providing a thorough grounding in the subject, students are made aware of the importance of relevant topics to a sophisticated understanding of global events and political developments.

This specification provides a concise summary of the main features of the Global Diplomacy programmes. The learning outcomes that a typical student might reasonably be expected to achieve and demonstrate if they take full advantage of the learning opportunities provided by the Global Diplomacy programme and associated pathways.

Students who successfully complete an MA Global Diplomacy will be able:

#### Subject specific - knowledge and understanding

- To understand and assimilate the main features of the landscape of global diplomacy and/or the region's diplomacy.
- To understand the relationship between theory and policy in international studies, diplomacy and political economy with special reference to global and/or regional diplomacy.
- To gain a theoretical and historical understanding of the practice of global diplomacy and/or the region's diplomacy, broadly conceived. To develop a sound knowledge of the scholarly literature of more than one discipline that constitutes the field (e.g. diplomatic studies, international politics, and political economy).
- To gain a rounded familiarity with the various actors within global and/or a regional diplomatic system. Develop the ability to think critically, with reference to theoretical and empirical (historical and/or contemporary) content about global and/or regional diplomacy.
- Engage with international studies and diplomatic studies, with particular institutional relevance of the perspective of the global region as applicable.
- Develop the skills needed for further independent research, writing and thinking in global and/or the region's diplomacy.

#### Intellectual and transferable skills:

- To analyse, evaluate and reflect critically on information received.
- To develop and present new ideas coherently and concisely extracting key elements from complex information.
- To research core issues independently.
- To present written and oral materials clearly and effectively and to engage constructively with feedback.
- To develop the ability to think critically, with reference to theoretical and empirical (historical and/or contemporary) content.
- To identify and solve problems, selecting and applying competing theories and methodologies appropriately.
- To gather, organise and deploy data and evidence to form balanced judgements and to develop and support critical argument and policy recommendations.
- To present written and oral materials clearly and effectively and to engage constructively with feedback.

- To engage in lateral thinking across different academic disciplines, types of arguments, evidence and methodologies.
- To take core decisions in complex situations.
- To work creatively, flexibly and co-operatively with others and to delegate responsibility.
- To assess and evaluate own and others' work constructively.

# Learning, teaching and assessment strategies

Students learn on this programme by engaging with academically rigorous and up-to-date learning materials and resources in a Virtual Learning Environment (VLE). For each module, students will be provided with access, through the University of London Online Library, to all necessary reading materials from a range of appropriate sources, as well as having access to the relevant journals and academic databases subscribed to by the University.

To help a student to organise their time, a bespoke Study Timetable is provided for each module and for the overall programme. This sets out the timetable for their learning and assessment. The programme and the modules themselves are carefully designed to allow students to progress according to their own learning styles. Modules are run over two sixmonthly periods, in conjunction with the ongoing study of the dissertation. Each module lasts 16 weeks, followed by one of the four stages of the dissertation module.

The VLE will give students instant access to current module materials, including the assessment tasks known as "e-tivities", electronic journals and other materials provided by the Online Library. Students will have a direct link to their dedicated Associate Tutor who will be the main point of contact between the University of London and the student. The Associate Tutor will facilitate student learning by helping students to structure their learning and by being available to assist students with any questions that they may have about the academic content of the programme. A technical team may also be called upon to help with any difficulties in accessing the VLE. A key component of the student experience will be peer to peer learning, and so students will be enrolled in bespoke discussion forums.

Each module, with the exception of the dissertation, has six online assessments (e-tivities), which take the form of written work prepared in response to a task or tasks specified by the Programme Director. E-tivity 6 for all modules (except the dissertation module) is a 4,500-5,000 word assignment submitted online.

The e-tivities provide formative and, in the case of e-tivites 2-6, summative feedback to Students, highlighting areas in which they can improve. E-tivites also act as a means of monitoring student progress. Timely and concise feedback for each e-tivity will be provided. The Global Diplomacy Board of Examiners will be the final arbiter of the above regulations and a student's completion of these criteria.

Students will also undertake a dissertation that relates to the named degree. The dissertation module is divided into four dissertation development stages; one stage is completed at the end of each module. Appropriate research methods are taught in each of the four stages to allow completion of the module as a whole through the submission of the dissertation. At the end of the second stage, students submit a research proposal counting

for 15 % and at the end of the fourth stage their dissertation counting for 85% of the overall dissertation module mark.

The purpose of this approach to the dissertation is to enable the student to develop and demonstrate their capacity to carry out a substantial piece of independent academic work on a selected topic.

Students will be assessed on their capacity to:

- define a topic;
- articulate a coherent scheme for examining the topic;
- gather necessary information; and
- analyse and present this information in a way that satisfactorily assesses the topic.

Assessment criteria for the programme take into account the level at which these skills have been achieved.

#### **Assessment methods**

Both the core and elective modules are assessed through a series of e-tivities culminating in the online submission of a written assessment, e-tivitiy 6, of 4,500-5,000 words (excluding footnotes, endnotes, bibliography and figures). E-tivities 2, 3, 4 and 5 have word counts between 400 and 1,500 words and are also submitted online. Of the six e-tivities, e-tivity 1 is assessed solely through formative assessment, e-tivities 2-6 carry either 5, 15 or 70 marks but also provide for summative assessment and feedback.

The dissertation module is assessed by the submission of a written dissertation of approximately 15,000 words, excluding the bibliography and appendices, which will account for 85% of the mark awarded for the module. The remaining 15% of the module mark will be based on the mark obtained for a 1,500 word research proposal.

# Student support and guidance

The following summarises the support and guidance available to students:

- The VLE: This gives access to materials (including lessons, activities and assignments) for each module studied.
- The VLE also includes a range of additional study resources such as:
  - Online student café and discussion areas which allow students to communicate with each other.
  - Past assessment papers and Examiners' commentaries; these provide generic feedback from assessment.
  - Employability skills module; guidance on how to manage your career in the future
- Module subject guides for each module studied; these introduce and develop the topics.
- Programme Regulations.

- <u>The Online Library</u>: This provides a range of full-text, multidisciplinary databases where journal articles, book reviews and reports can be found.
- University of London library: Registered students may use the resources located within the Senate House library.
- A University of London email account and web area for personal information management.

## **Quality evaluation and enhancement**

The University of London delivers the majority of its flexible and distance learning programmes through a collaboration between the University of London Worldwide and member institutions of the University of London. However some of the flexible and distance learning programmes draw solely on academic input from the University of London, and are delivered without academic lead by a member institutions. The policies, partnerships (where applicable) and quality assurance mechanisms applicable for the programmes are defined in the following key documents: The Quality Framework, the <a href="Quality Assurance Schedules">Quality Assurance Schedules</a>, <a href="Quidelines for Examinations">General Regulations</a> and, for each programme, <a href="programme">programme</a> specific regulations.

#### **Award standards**

All University of London qualifications have to align with the <u>Frameworks for Higher Education Qualifications of UK Degree-Awarding Bodies</u> to assure appropriate standards for each qualification. In addition, every programme that is developed by a member institution of the University of London (or a consortium with representation by more than one member institution) will be developed to the same standard as would be applied within the institution concerned. Proportionate and robust approval procedures, including external scrutiny and student engagement are in place for all programmes. Learning materials are written and all assessments are set and marked by academic staff who are required to apply the University's academic standards.

#### **Review and evaluation mechanisms**

Some of the key mechanisms in place to assure the standards of all University of London qualifications and the quality of the student experience, include:

- Annual programme reports: produced for all programmes in order to review and enhance the provision and to plan ahead;
- Independent external examiners: submit reports every year to confirm that a programme has been assessed properly and meets the appropriate academic standards;
- Annual student information statistics: prepared for all systematic reporting within the University of London;
- Periodic programme reviews: carried out every 4-6 years to review how a programme has developed over time and to make sure that it remains current and up-to-date.

Improvements are made as necessary to ensure that systems remain effective and rigorous.

#### Student feedback mechanisms

The principal channel for collecting feedback from students is the Student Experience Survey. Carried out every two years, this collects feedback from the student body on a range of topics relating to the student lifecycle. The results are analysed externally and then considered in a number of different ways, including by the programme team, principal committees and the senior leadership team. Details of any resulting actions taken are published on the Virtual Learning Environment and the Student Portal.

Additionally, on completion of their programme of study students will be invited to take a survey that seeks to measure what they have gained from their studies.

There are also opportunities for students to get involved in governance. An undergraduate and postgraduate student member is appointed by the University to the majority of committees through an annual appointment round. Some programmes also recruit student members at the programme level. Students are frequently invited to take part in quality review processes such as Periodic Programme Reviews, Programme approval, Thematic Reviews, MOOC review panels and ad hoc focus groups. Opportunities such as these are advertised through social media and on the website. More information can be found on the website.

Students can also apply to join the Student Voice Group, which meets four times a year to consider initiatives for enhancing student experience. Notes from these meetings are published on the Student Portal.

## After graduation

#### **Further study**

Successful completion of the programme can allow students to progress to a higher level award in the subject area.

#### **Graduate employment routes**

Students who choose to study a Global Diplomacy programme do so as it provides them with an opportunity to merge a strong theoretical understanding with equally rigorous practical skills that equip them to go out into the workforce with both knowledge and the ability to deliver. University of London uses an intricate combination of expertise, cutting edge research and practical skills which makes its students attractive to employers.

These programmes programmes provide sound intellectual and skills training, which are useful for analysing and designing solutions to many of today's global problems. Graduating students have gone on to a variety of professions where they have been able to utilise the knowledge and skills they learned while studying with the University of London.

#### The Alumni Community

Upon finishing a course of study, graduates automatically become part of the University of London alumni community, a diverse global network of more than one million graduates in over 180 countries, providing lifelong links to the University and to each other.

Alumni are encouraged to keep in touch after they graduate and to become active members of the alumni community; in return they receive a number of benefits and services, including an extensive programme of events and engagement opportunities.
